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

Every other month, I experience a mild sense of panic as I try and come up with something new



for the Village News editorial. I imagine this is something akin to that experienced by vicars as they try and devise the weekly sermon, but there all similarity ends. This time I thought I should try something topical. Possibly, the Royal Wedding, but Pam Lowther has covered that admirably and there is even a mention in the gardening section. What about international terrorism? Following the death of Bin Laden I scanned the parish minutes anxiously to see if any large walled compounds were planned for Pillaton. The new extension in Briar's Ryn seems unlikely to pose much threat from Al Qaeda, but the recent discovery of marshmallows in the same locality is far more troubling (see Neighbourhood Watch article, page 18). That left me with the recent referendum on the alternative vote, not the most promising subject for the Village News, but I'll do my best. On 5th May I went to exercise my democratic right at the Village Hall, had the pick of three voting booths – it wasn't very busy – and then experienced a distinct sense of unease. Instead of being confronted with the simple question "Do you wish to change the current voting system? – Yes or No," there was a curious preamble about first past the post voting, before the question itself, with the two tick boxes being tucked away at the bottom right of the form. I think I ticked the appropriate box, but even now nagging doubts still linger. Some further research on the internet has revealed that I was not alone; Beverley in Tadcaster experienced similar difficulties. So if the referendum result did not go the way you wanted you can always blame Beverley and me.

PLANNING PERMISSION

The Council approved, with one abstention, the application for the proposed change at Howton Farm from agricultural to combined agricultural and solar energy production site.

CORNWALL DEVELOPMENT

The Council having studied the documents decided to support the proposal that expansion should be focused on towns.

FINANCE

The Bank position of Current Account £763 and Deposit Account £3,274 was noted.

It was noted that from April 2011 HMRC required all Parish Councils including Pillaton Parish Council to register with the Tax authorities as an Employer.

CORNWALL YESTERYEAR

On Friday April 8 it was a balmy spring evening – a perfect night for nostalgia and reminiscence for the South West Film and Television Archive film show in the Village Hall.

A capacity audience packed into the hall to enjoy scenes from yesteryear in and around Pillaton and Callington. Graeme Spinks from the Film Archive introduced the show and then really allowed the footage to speak for itself much of the time.

Impossible to recount all of the hour and a half show, but amongst the most memorable pieces for me personally, there was a dreamy film of the crossing from Calstock to Cotehele in the little "ferry on demand", with an iconic shot of a steam train running over Calstock viaduct in the background; hilarious footage of Calstock carnival in 1969 and Gunnislake carnival in 1939; wonderful "talking heads" including the last station mistress from Latchley station, an ancient ex miner who had sought his fortune in Canada only to return homesick to Cornwall, and a Gunnislake character remembering the hey days of the mining era when St Ann's Chapel was thronged with Saturday night revellers.

We watched Sir Harry Secombe chatting to Dan Du Plessis on the eve of his retirement from active farming, and we saw how hard it was to grub a living from growing fruit and vegetables on the slopes of the Tamar around Cotehele. On a serious note, we listened to the water bailiff (who had the most wonderful voice) going about his business on the river and philosophising about the risks of greed destroying all that we find beautiful about the Tamar.

Graeme ended the show with some wonderful footage of Pillaton gymkhanas at the end of the 1950s and beginning of

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the 1960s. There were a number of muffled exclamations from the audience as people recognised relatives or friends from the past – and it seems that the gymkhana back then took place where Briars Ryn is built today!

I hope all who attended, enjoyed the show – certainly feedback suggests that you did – and apologies to those who were disappointed when tickets sold out. It has been suggested that maybe we could invite Graeme to do another (different) show for us next year, so please pass expressions of interest on to Sue or Ann.

It just remains for me to thank you all for supporting this event, which raised a little over £300 for the Village Hall Fund – money much needed with the current cost of heating oil and other commodities. A special thank you to the generous folks who donated prizes for the raffle, which in itself raised a third of the total profit!

PILLATON WI

There was a palpable air of, if not quite tension, then certainly anticipation, in Pillaton Village Hall as we assembled for the Annual Meeting in March. Being aware that our President, Alison Downing, had come to the end of her three year term of service and also that no nominations had as yet been received to fill the role, we were not at all sure what may happen to our WI.

The evening began with the regular business meeting and reminders of forthcoming events both locally and within the County. Dates for diaries include our birthday meal in the Village Hall on 19 March and the group meeting at St Ive on 14 April, when the guest speaker will be Barbara Smetherham. President Alison Downing gave a brief report of the very enjoyable County organised Operetta day at Withiel on 11 March, when Peter Clarke talked to a packed hall of unusually silent WI ladies through the history of Operetta. This was an excellent seminar with an able presenter, copiously illustrated with wonderful music by Offenbach, Gilbert and Sullivan, Johann Strauss II and others. Peter concluded by showing how Operetta, the popular music for the nineteenth century, gave way to the musicals, such as "Oklahoma!" which have become today's popular music of choice.

Now for the Annual Meeting! We were fortunate to be able to welcome County Advisor Pam Parnell to guide us through a potentially difficult session and hopefully save our WI from being closed down.

Treasurer, Sue Archer, and Secretary, Pam Lowther, presented excellent financial and annual reports of the year's activities. Pam described our busy and successful year, which included the high profile Garden Safari day, attracting some 300 visitors to our small village and raising funds for our local community. Our programme secretary, Jenny Francis, had organised a varied selection of speakers for our monthly meetings attended by an average of 60% of our 39 members. Our monthly bookstall, operated by Angela Kingdon and Rosemary Long, continues to encourage book swaps between members — a valuable service in a village some way from the nearest library. Our Press Officer, Ann Henderson, had

been awarded the West Briton cup for her coverage of Pillaton meetings, and our team in the Festival of the Spoken Word had been placed third. Additional activities included Birthday and Christmas parties, craft evenings, a visit to flower arranger Barbara Smetherham and a village wide collection for local charity Operation Sunshine.

In her address, outgoing President, Alison Downing, thanked the "dedicated committee" for their hard work and commitment, highlighting how their efforts have enabled Pillaton WI to thrive and continue to attract new members.

Wasting no time, County Advisor Pam Parnell then took the floor to guide us through the voting process for a new President. At the last moment, a tenth nomination for Committee came forward and Pam handed voting slips to all members present.

A few more moments of tension as Pam checked through the slips and asked those nominated if they would accept the role – and at last members could relax as the new President for Pillaton WI was named as Liz Llewellyn Jones.

Diamonds are forever...or do you prefer garnets, or pearls, or maybe gold? Ann Argyrides of Pengelly Jewellers in Callington, our guest speaker in April, tempted us with a gorgeous selection of pretty pieces during her presentation.

For the past eleven years, she has run the business founded by her parents during the 1950s, when literally everything was done in-house, and she has memories of her father staying up till 2.00 am mending clocks and watches for customers.

Ann's passion for jewellery shone through as she talked about nature's store yielding its precious harvest of metals, gemstones, shells...As she talked, she let bracelets and neck chains slide gently through her fingers, turning them to catch the light and bringing the colour of the stones alive. Carefully laid out in trays, they passed around the room, giving us a chance to hold and admire them.

Nature's store seemed an apt description as we handled amber – imagine! Millions of years old – and the colour is determined by the tree the sap

came from, so for example cherry amber has that lovely rich, almost red colour. Then jet, beloved of Queen Victoria, and essentially the remains of centuries old wood. Ann showed the differences between freshwater and open sea pearls. The freshwater ones are whiter (and cheaper), but when you realise that the open sea pearls are found by divers in far away places like Japan, you begin to understand why they are so prized.

Of course she saved the best till last and ended with the precious stones we covet so much; diamonds, emeralds, sapphires and rubies. Diamonds are the most highly valued stones, but could we tell the difference between a ring set with real diamonds and an identical, but considerably cheaper one set with cubic zirconia, the synthetic man made stone? They circulated the room, and Ann took the vote – hands up for the real diamond ring! And of course, as WI ladies are a discerning bunch, we got it right!

The business meeting was the first chaired by our new President, Liz Llewellyn Jones, who suggested a few changes to reduce time spent on routine matters at meetings. These agreed, we moved on to discuss planned activities and diary dates for the coming month. Members are attending both the Brunel Group meeting and the County Spring Countdown meeting and items of interest from the County News were brought to our attention.

Within Pillaton, two community activities were noted; the proposal that we organise a workshop to create ceramic tiles for the project to enhance the area surrounding the Village Hall, and the Village party planned to celebrate the Royal Wedding on 29 April.

Our next meeting will be on 9 May, when we will have a lively debate on the WI Resolutions prior to the WI National AGM in Liverpool this June, where the Resolution will be put to the floor.

FRUIT CASE

The range of blossom in the village this spring, has been a wonder. The explosion of camellia, magnolia, and cherry blossom last month, bowed out to make way for apple, pear and plum blossom, the abundance of which, coupled with the fine still days, promises a bumper crop at harvest time. The amount of bees I have rescued from the greenhouse can only add to this hopeful forecast.

My little hardwood box screwed to my fence to allow bees to overwinter in comfort, has been humming, and the home made front doors have been flying open and emitting bees to 'do their thing'. To actually seeing this piece of trendy environmental paraphernalia actually working is most heartening.

I have a great respect for bees, not based purely on my self interested love of fruit and honey, but on their sound work ethic and their unconscious symbiotic relationship with man, it is quite moving. So I always save bees, even rescuing them from spiders' webs!

Wasps and hornets get a different welcome, from the small oak tamper, that I normally use to flatten the soil in seed trays!

I killed a queen wasp that foolishly came into my greenhouse whilst I was re-potting, It was a monster ,about one and a quarter inches long. I did keep the big hornet in the glass jar when I captured him last year, never having seen one before he was a whopper too! I have been stung by wasps, who attack for no reason whereas bees are more benevolent.

The long spell of hot weather enabled me to get out all the early sown beans and peas which were shouting to be let out of the greenhouse. I find that starting legumes off in pots in the greenhouse gives them a better start, once they are growing the mice do not eat them.

Slugs have been knocked back by the cold winter, but I still put Nemaslug down prior to planting out tender soft vegetables. I am a poor loser.

Fighting bugs, pigeons and keeping other peoples' cats from fouling young seedlings, can be expensive. Cats can be sneaky as well as destructive and tend to violate my vegetable beds at night or before my Mabel is on patrol.

The hot spell proved beneficial to all, though not always to a gardener's advantage, for it produced a 'supersaurus' crop of dandelions, the seeds of which could be clearly visible on the light breeze, they were everywhere, verges, lawns, beds, and drives and, with Percy Thrower's famous phrase 'ONE YEAR'S SEED, 7 YEAR'S WEEDS' in mind, went regularly round the garden, armed with a poly-bag, gathering the clocks, buds and flowers from the dandelions within my garden. It is a lost cause, as you can see more seeds flying over the fence, to curse me for months to come!

The clematis is now blooming to celebrate the Royal Wedding, and how lovely it all was. The whole day felt blessed, warm not blistering weather, a superbly organised, splendiferous royal occasion with all the traditional sparkling splendour that only Great Britain can produce. A state occasion but the whole country seemed unified in celebrating this marriage of two sensible, intelligent young adults who knew their own minds, and wanted to include the public in their joy.

Pillitonians continued their celebrations at the village hall, in the way they do best, eating drinking and making merry, with races and games, passing parcels and laughing at silly red, white and blue costumes!

The whole day was a reaffirmation that life can be good, full of fun and laughter, reminding us of the joy of young love, and the promise of a bright future. The day was a warm duvet to snuggle in.
