Eustace Trehane Elliott, 1884-1917

In September 2020, Robert Smith very kindly made contact with the website to provide some information about Eustace Trehane Elliott who was one of the seven service men from Pillaton killed in WW1 (see The Lost Men of Pillaton: 1914-1918.

The images he supplied (which are shown below) include a section of a roll of honour from the 1920s, complete with portrait, and a glazed frame in his possession containing Eustace Trehane Elliott's medals, memorial plaque and memorial scroll. The frame was acquired through Robert's interest in military medals, the two shown in the case being the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. In between these is the badge of the East Yorkshire regiment.

The wording on the memorial scroll is difficult to read so is also given here:

He whom this scroll commemorates was numbered among those who, at the call of King and Country, left all that was dear to them, endured hardness, faced danger, and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of duty and self-scrifice, giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom.

Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten.

the Expeditionary Force in France, Monte AU, 2nd Lieut., 1st Battn. (13th ELLIOTT, CHARLES ARTHUR BOILEAU, 2nd Lieut., 1st Battn. (13th Foot) Prince Albert's (Somersetshire Light Infantry), only s. of the Rev. Charles Foot) Prince Albert's (Somersetshire Light Infantry), only s. of the Rev. Charles Peel, eldest dan. of the Rev. Philip Stephen O'Brien. Vicar of Camden Church, Camberwell, S.E.; b. London, 9 Feb. 1893; edue. Repton, and Jesus College. Cambridge, where he was studying with a view to taking Holy Orders when war torke out; obtained a commission in the 4th (Territorial) Battn. Norfolk Regt. 21 Aug. 1914, having been a member of the O.T.C., both at school and college; served with the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force at Gallipoli from Aug. 1915, where he was wounded; proceeded to Egypt in Jan. 1916; transferred to the Somersetshire Light Infantry the following Oct.: served with the Expeditionary Force in France from 3 Feb. 1917, and died at Aubigny 12 April following, from wounds received in action at the Battle of Arras on the 10th. Buried at Duisans. His Colonel wrote: "He was an excellent officer and is a great loss to me.... He was hit by a bullet on the 10th while leading his men in an attack. He had taken part the previous day in a very successful attack," and Lieut. Osbourne : "EllIOT twent over the top with the battalion on 9 April, taking part in the Battle of Arras, which was one of the greatest successes of the war. Part of the regiment went over again on the 10th; this is when Elliott was wounded. He did splendid work in the attack." Unm. ELLIOTT, EUSTACE TREHANE, 2nd
