

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillors Hoskin, Dolley, S Floyd, Edwards and Martin declared a personal interest in payments in respect of the Village Hall improvements.

PUBLIC FORUM

There was one member of the public present.

MINUTES

The Minutes of 19th October 2011 meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

District Councillor Egglestone informed the Council that she was pursuing the maintenance of Mushton Lane.

The Chairman explained that he had repaired the train at the play park after its removal by the suppliers.

VILLAGE HALL IMPROVEMENTS

The Chairman explained that there were concerns regarding the resurfacing of the entrance area to the Hall and it was recommended that the Village Hall Committee express the concerns to the Pillaton Playground Project.

The Council approved payments of £1,054.76 to Greenbarnes Ltd for a notice board and £400 to the artist from the grants received for the project.

PLANNING PERMISSION

The Council approved the planning application in respect of the construction of a conservatory and alterations to windows at Rowse.

PROPOSED SKATE PARK

The Council supported in principle the creation of a skate park in Pillaton with the following requirements on the proposers; they must raise funds for the scheme through grants as in the case of the Hall extension and Play Park otherwise there would be an unacceptable increase in the Parish rate and they must obtain a suitable site which did not give rise to complaints of noise.

FINANCE

The Bank position of Current Account £765 and Deposit Account £4.502 was noted.

The following payments were approved:

£14.89 for materials for the train repair and £38.98 toner.

The Council delayed approval of the proposed precept for 2012 to 2013 until prices had been received for a new notice board.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Councillor Harris gave feedback on his negotiations in respect of defining the route of the Smeaton to Trehill footpath.



ATTENDANCE

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillors Hoskin, Dolley, S Floyd, Edwards and Martin declared a personal interest in payments in respect of the Village Hall improvements.

PUBLIC FORUM

There was no member of the public present.

MINUTES

The Minutes of 16th November 2011 meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

The Chairman reported that he had met with District Councillor Egglestone, St Mellion Chair and Cornwall Highways regarding the maintenance of Mushton lane. The result was that Cornwall Highways agreed that maintenance was required but no funds for the work existed. The Parish Council agreed that Pillaton and St Mellion Council taxes should not be raised to cover costs of repair.

The Chairman thanked Councillor Martin for materials to repair the train and Kevin Horsham and Ray Crocker for reinstating the train at the play park.

Councillor D Floyd reported that the salt bin at Pillaton Mill had been refilled.

VILLAGE HALL IMPROVEMENTS

The Chairman explained that concerns continued regarding the resurfacing of the entrance area to the Hall and the builders had

promised to remedy the faults. The successful planting of the trees and shrubs was recorded.

The Council approved payments of £240 and £1,800 to MOR, £1,850 to Twinways and £588 to KPP from the grants received for the project.

PLANNING PERMISSION

The Council issued an apology to Mr and Mrs Clarke regarding confusion over a planning application at Polborder Cottage.

NEW NOTICE BOARD

The Council supported a proposal to purchase a new notice board for the Village and Councillor Edwards volunteered to select the most appropriate board.

FINANCE

The Bank position of Current Account £3,566 and Deposit Account £4,502 was noted.

The following payments were approved:

£450 for grass cutting and £989.76 for fencing.

The Council approved a precept for 2012 to 2013 of £3,170.



In September we welcomed 11 new children in Reception, which I think is a record for us! The monies raised will be spent on a trip to the panto in Plymouth in January and some more IT peripherals. The children benefit hugely from the use of IT in the curriculum, but IT is

a constant drain on the stretched school budget (which gets further stretched each year, despite our rising numbers on roll).

We rounded the term off with a brilliant Y3-Y6 (KS2) Christmas production which told the Christmas story most eloquently with some superb acting and singing. Class 1 brought the school carol service to life with their nativity complete with angels who were lit up with fairy lights, and a shadow puppet show. Again the singing was lovely!

FRUIT CASE

It is alarming how many Pillitonians have been 'under the weather' during the Christmas holidays. The news of the more seriously ill, quickly travels on the bush telegraph, whilst the abundance of winter colds and infections are evident, by the absence of characters from social events.

My family was certainly not immune from the bludgeoning of winter cold infections, in fact variations on a cold theme seemed to circulating amongst us in differing forms for weeks, making the whole family miserable.

Communication was difficult, snorts and pig like grunts were common...and sneezing the norm. I was warned that having children living with you would act as a magnet to all the bugs imaginable, my optimism at the time now, seems foolish. I was reminded of the comments of an old hand in the staff room when I started my first teaching job, who readily assured me that when I had been teaching a few years I would even become immune to bubonic plague!!!

I have already received my seed catalogues, so I will have to start thinking about the growing season. The clock move round and we start the season of planting, sowing and weeding all over again. The bulbs are already breaking through the soil in their pots under the greenhouse benches ready for door step displays, but the problem for the Spring Garden Show will be, will there be any blooms to display by the time the show comes around???




