Happy New Year. Today, as I write this editorial, it is 'Blue

Monday, supposedly the most depressing day of the year. It's probably a whole lot of pseudo-science, but according to those who study such things the date can be calculated from a variety of factors, such as weather, debt, the length of time since Christmas, and neglected New Year's resolutions. This year we can also add in Coronavirus, lockdown and business uncertainty following the UK's departure from the EU and the weather is pretty rubbish as well.

So not the most optimistic note on which to start the first editorial of the year, so I'll have to try and employ a bit of 'boosterism' to lighten the tone.

Across the pond, in the USA, politics seem to be returning to a more normal state of affairs after the Trump years. As my wife rather wryly commented, 'I bet when Donald Trump was a baby, he must have had very few toys in his pram.'

Closer to home, and even more encouraging, there appear to be considerable strides being made with the rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine. In fact, there are several different vaccines in use or in the pipeline, Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, Janssen, Novavax and Oxford-Astrozenca.

Sounds a bit like the way some police forces have exercised their powers regarding lockdown rules.

#### TO BE STRICTLY OBSERVED

#### By the Parents, Relatives and Guardians of the Children

#### ADMITTED INTO

# PILLATON SCHOOL

- 1st. They must send their Children regularly to School, clean, washed, their hair cut short and combed, at Five Minutes before Nine, in the morning, and at Five Minutes before Two in the Afternoon.
- 2nd. They must send their Children on the Sunday, in the morning, at *Half-past Nine* and in the afternoon, at *Half-past Two*, unless leave of absence is given or on account of distance, or some other good and sufficient reason.
- 3rd. They must never keep their Children from School without leave, except in case of sickness, and then they must send word to the Master.
- 4th. They are not to take their Children away without giving notice of their intention so to do, to the Master.
- 5th. They are never to interfere with the Rules of the School nor to object to their Children receiving such correction for bad behaviour, as may be considered necessary. It will be taken that no Child shall be punished unnecessarily or harshly treated in School. This Rule must be *particularly* attended to.
- 6th. No Child will be permitted to remain in the School who does not attend regularly (unless leave of absence is given) and who does not come clean in every respect.
- 7th. They are to send One Penny, every Monday Morning, with all the Free Children.
- 8th. They must order their Children to pay strict attention to the following Rules.

#### **RULES FOR THE CHILDREN**

- 1st. The Children must go to and from the School, in a quiet and orderly manner.
- 2nd. They must behave respectfully to their Master and Mistress, and always obey their directions.
- 3rd. They must take great care of their Books and Slates.
- 4th. They must be diligent whilst at School: attentive and serious during the daily prayer in the School; and serious, attentive, and devout during the Service in the Church on the Sabbath.
- 5th. They must be kind to one another, always speak the truth, never use bad Language, nor take anything which does not belong to them.
- 6th. They must expect to be punished if they do not act according to the Rules.
- 7th. The Children will be rewarded twice in the Year, according to their *conduct, attention* and *improvement*.

N.B. The Parents are particularly requested to see that their Children *pray, morning* and *evening,* without which cannot expect the Blessing of God. And they are further exhorted to second the instruction given to their Children at School by their own good example, that their Children's sins may not be visited upon them in the great Judgement Day.

### **CENSUS 2021**

The next census in England and Wales is due to take place on Sunday 21 March 2021, and will be administered by the Office for National Statistics (ONS). The census seeks to collect demographic information from all households and communal establishments and will be the first to be carried out primarily online. The census provides a level of detail that isn't possible from other government surveys and contributes to policy decisions, including local government funding.

There will be three new questions in the 2021 census, covering:

Veteran status: whether the respondent has ever served in the Armed Forces. Sexual orientation; this question is voluntary and only apply to those over 16. Gender identity: whether the respondent's gender is different from the sex they were registered as at birth. Again voluntary and only apply to over 16s.

The ONS' target is to have 75% of census returns completed online, with the remainder completed on traditional paper forms. Most households will receive a unique code in the post enabling them to complete their returns online. The ONS will put provisions in place to support households that may have difficulty accessing an online census. Households in some areas will receive a paper form to start with, and any household will be able to receive a paper form on request. Clearly the Covid-19 outbreak poses challenges for carrying out the census, but the current plan is still for it to go ahead this March in England and Wales, and also Northern Ireland, but this could change.

# PILLATON 1921

Continuing my series of looking back at Pillaton in previous years, this time to the year 1921.

On a national level much of the government focus was on Ireland, with armed struggle continuing between the IRA and the British Army. However, December 1921 saw the signing of the Anglo-Irish Treaty establishing the Irish Free State as an independent nation incorporating 26 of Ireland's 32 counties; the remaining six counties forming the province of Northern Ireland.

There was also a national coal strike resulting from the Government' return of the mines from wartime control to their private owners who insisted on wage cuts. The strike lasted three months and ended with the miners having to accept pay cuts.

Internationally, reparations for World War 1 were imposed on Germany, which led to a dramatic hyperinflation. Also, in an ominous portent for the future. Adolf Hitler became the leader of the Nazi party.

In 1921 in the UK there were two major tragedies. On 20 January, a Royal Navy K-class submarine K5 sank in the Channel with all 57 on board lost. Then in August 44 people were killed when an R38 Class airship exploded near Hull.

In Pillaton it was much quieter where apart from the usual run of hunting news and details of agricultural shows there were few items of news.

On 4 January, the wedding of Miss Ida Helen Hocking, youngest daughter of Reverend Richard Hocking, Vicar of Pillaton took place in St Odulph's Church. A large congregation turned out for her marriage to Mr Herbert Read of Exeter. The bride was given away by her brother Lieutenant Richard Hocking RNR and her father officiated.. A large reception was held at the Rectory and afterwards the happy couple departed for a honeymoon on the Italian Riviera.

Another big local society event took place on 18 June when Thurstan Collins hosted a fete in the beautiful grounds of Newton Ferrers to raise funds for heating apparatus in Pillaton Church. The occasion was the first time the grounds of Newton Ferrers had been open to the public for many years with Lady Ernestine Edgcumbe formally opening proceedings at 2 o'clock. Admission to the Grounds cost 1s. 4d; children under 12 half-price. To entertain the crowds there were performances by talented artistes and a band, along with a Shooting Gallery, Aunt Sally, Fancy Stall, Work Stall, Jumble Stall, Stall, Flower Stall, Bran Pie, and refreshments.

The only other item of note for Pillaton I've managed to find for 1921 was that local farmer William Hawke junior appeared in court in August for riding his motorcycle at Burrator without lights after dark and not producing his licence. He was fined 30 shillings for each offence and his licence was endorsed.

In wider local news, during May a motoring tour through of Cornwall by the Prince of Wales (the future King Edward VIII) attracted widespread attention in the very patriotic newspapers of the time. On Monday 23 May, the Prince visited Newquay War Memorial, inspected the men of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry at Bodmin, passed through Liskeard and Callington where he was met by thronging crowds and "flowers were frequently showered upon the smiling Prince." Also included on the itinerary was an inspection of livestock at Stoke Climsland and a trip to Landulph Church. At the end of the day, "the Royal party finally motored to Cotehele for the night as guests of the Earl of Mount-Edgcumbe after an exacting but pleasant and brilliantly successful day."

The president of the Council Simon Linford commented that their performance, 'really captured the imagination, with comments received, describing it variously as 'fabulous', 'absolutely incredible', 'brilliant to watch', 'astonishing', and even 'soothing'.

Maire's own comment was that it was, "Not bad for a group of elderly ladies who meet (or used to) once a week for a ring, a chat and a cuppa. # PILLATON RAINFALL FIGURES

To crown what has been a rather dismal year, December, with 346mm of rain, was the wettest month in Pillaton over the past ten years that Brian Hutfield has been keeping records. It also helped to make 2020 the wettest year over that tenyear span with a total rainfall of 1761mm thus beating the previous highest, last year's 1708mm. Two very wet years in succession. Is this a trend?

The worst of December's rain came on the 18th. According to the Government Flood Warning site, the Lynher just topped its highest recorded level at the Pillaton measuring station at midnight between 18th-19th December with a level of 2.44m. Unfortunately, this caused problems for those living near the river.

To reinforce this 'stay at home' message the library service has temporarily turned off the usual library notifications reminding you to bring your books back. All this information is still available on your library account page, where you can also renew books. Our two nearest libraries have also waived overdue charges. Opening times for the two libraries are as follows:


