## ST MELLION SCHOOL NEWS

We are half way through the school year and Spring is in the air! The school grounds are looking bright and cheery with the daffodils in



flower. There are also some amazing Easter Island heads carved from breeze blocks standing proud in the flower beds. They were made by our Y5/6 pupils, carefully guided by Mrs Amanda Copson, our wonderfully creative art and design technology specialist.

The children were recently invited to help create a willow dome for the Village Hall Green Area and Playing Field in the centre of Pillaton. They worked hard with Richard and Sue of Wind Rush Willows, making holes in the ground, and planting the willow saplings. Later in the day some of the children helped weave the horizontal withies. I know that the children will be very keen to see how the dome grows and takes shape and form over the next few months. The children were also shown how to weave withies using a technique borrowed from corn dollies to form bird feeders. These will hang in the playing field and back at school. Thank you to Jules, Omar and the committee for including us in the project. The playing field is looking wonderful and must bring such joy to so many children and their families.

We love getting involved in community projects. Did you know that the Cotehele Garland included some flowers that we grew at school? Our pupils who attend Gardening Club had a hand in the creation of the garland (the one in the restaurant).

We "dos y dos'd" our partners, promenaded and swang our way around the room as Gil called out the moves — which needless to say we all got wrong every time, to much laughter and merriment. As member Jan Simms put it bluntly, the dancing would have been improved by a few handsome young men in kilts, but we had to imagine those as we danced the "Gay Gordons".

Gil proved a patient teacher, explaining the background to the dances and telling us how the gentlemen always held the lady on their right to allow room to draw their sabres if they needed to, while the ladies needed room to accommodate their wide skirted frocks as they paraded in the dance. All in all, it was great fun, leaving us well and truly ready for a cuppa at the end of the session.

The business meeting recorded that our carol singing efforts around the village had raised enough money to donate £95 each to ShelterBox and the Children's Hospice South West, a worthy result. Secretary Pam Lowther reminded us we should be considering our choices for the 2012 Resolutions, the final selection to be debated at our May meeting, and Treasurer Sue Archer reminded us that subs for this year are now due.

Dates for our diaries included the village meeting on 30 January to think about how Pillaton as a community might celebrate the Queen's Jubilee and the celebration dinner in the Village Hall for Pillaton WI's 65th birthday on 24 March. Lists were circulated for some County events, including the County lunch on 22 March, "Let's Party" with Alison and Dot on 29 March and the Gershwin Day on 30 March.

Excitement had been building for a couple of weeks. On everyone's lips were the words "It'll be Giovanni next meeting!" or "You know he's coming next time, don't you?" So it was with heightened anticipation of a good evening in store that WI members gathered in **February** for the welcome return of guest speaker, Italian chef Giovanni Sponziello once again ably assisted by our President, Liz Llewellyn-Jones.

Isn't it amazing how evocative smell can be? As the aromas of garlic, olive oil, bacon and baby tomatoes, simmering away, filled the Village Hall it became easy to imagine the blue skies, sunshine and warmth of Giovanni's native Puglia. As he cooked he talked – of "What my mum used to do" or of "freshly made pasta drying on the kitchen table in Italy ready for Sunday's family lunch". We hung on his words, enjoying the Italian accent, and waited greedily to taste the savoury dishes – *Pasta con broccoli; Uova al tegame con fave verde; Tagliattelli con zucchini e limone and Tortellini con pomodoro e formaggio.* (Not just a cookery demonstration, but an Italian lesson as well!)

As before, Giovanni gave lots of hints while he cooked. Use dried pasta – it's better than shop bought fresh pasta, which should only ever be eaten homemade on the same day. Make sure you squeeze the moisture out of the grated courgettes for the zucchini recipe before adding to the crispy bacon in the pan. Of course, he recommends only using Italian Extra Virgin olive oil – especially as it comes from Puglia, his home region! Missed the fun? He has promised to type up recipe sheets, so we can all savour a taste of Italian sunshine at home.

The business meeting contained some important news to note. Our March meeting is the Annual Meeting and as yet we have no nominations for the all important role of Secretary. Liz reminded us that as this is a key position on the Committee, it absolutely must be filled to ensure that Pillaton WI can continue to function.

On the social side, village events coming up include Pillaton WI's 65th birthday celebration dinner on 24 March – friends and partners are invited to join us for a meal cooked by Shirley Floyd and served in the Village Hall. County news and events included details of the Spring Countdown meeting, for which we need a delegate; "Let's Party with Alison and Dot" on 29 March and the Gershwin Day on 30 March.

# PROJECT

There has been much interest expressed in the recently installed "sculptural elements" to the Village Hall green area and within the Playing Field by residents and our feathered visitors. The birds haven't needed to ask "What are they?" as it is quite obvious to them....they are bird boxes!



The bird boxes have been

designed by David Burma of MOR design based in Falmouth in Cornwall. David's career in Landscape Architecture has spanned 30 years and has enabled him to travel the world working in Australia and America before he moved to Cornwall in 1998. David's brief was to create artistic elements within the improvements being made to the Playing Field and Village Hall, combining sculpture with nature. He designed the rustic bird boxes which sit upon individual "windswept" poles and the bespoke picnic benches made of green oak that have been carved with names of birds.

Pillaton Playground Project Committee was successful in gaining a total of £28,640 from the Community Spaces Programme. This programme, managed by Groundworks UK is funded by the Big Lottery Funds Changes Initiative.

Pupils from St Mellion School have recently assisted the project, helping to make a living willow dome within the playing field and taking part in a willow object making project, producing sculptural willow balls and bird feeders out of dried willow.

A big thank you to all those who have helped and continue to volunteer to improve our Village by these improvements!

## WATCH YOUR STEP!

I thoroughly enjoy reading Jan Simms' gardening articles in the Village News. I confess that I always read her rants about dog poo with a certain amount of detachment – until I became a dog walker myself.

Now there are two ways of walking — with a dog or without one, and they are quite different. In my "BD" (Before Dog) days, I happily wandered the lanes with my eyes fixed ahead, enjoying distant views, contemplating the tracery of branches against the sky, looking at the cloud formations and generally just meandering in the fresh air. "AD" (After Dog) walking requires another approach entirely. My charge decides which side of the lane we'll walk — sometimes both sides need to be investigated so there is a certain amount of to-ing and fro-ing — and she usually has her nose close to the ground. I find myself watching closely what she's doing to make sure she's not about to be poisoned by snaffling something unmentionable from the mulch along the verges.

I also need to be prepared for the moment when she decides it's time for a toilet stop. Now she is a fastidious creature in this respect. She takes time to select an appropriate spot before going. So while she's sniffing the ground, I am looking at the grass as well and cannot fail to notice the amazing piles of poo just everywhere. Our normal route takes us past the dog poo bin at the corner of Pillaton en route for Clapper Bridge. I've mentally renamed the corner "Pooh Corner" — pity the poor folks living nearby. Given the proximity of the dog poo bin, I find it hard to understand why dog walkers are apparently unable to pick up their dog's droppings and deposit them in it. The mess continues all the way down the hill. One has to be careful where one treads to avoid stepping in it, especially if a passing car means standing in against the verge.

Worst of all, I find myself looking at my dog walking friends and neighbours and thinking to myself "Is it you?"

So, please, may I add my voice to Jan's and ask you to do the decent thing? When you take your dog for a walk, take a bag with you! And pick up the poo before we are all in the s\*\*\*. Thanks!

## FRUIT CASE

Spring has arrived, at last. The plague of colds, coughs and throat infections have given way to smiles, outings, gym sessions and energetic outdoor activities, and we are all better for it. I knew 'it' was here a couple of weeks ago when, walking Mabel, I saw the buzzards elegantly riding the thermals, high over the river valley, oblivious of the world below. The day was bright, as the dark couple were swirling high, rapt in their annual dance.

The world has dried, the mild weather continuing to bring shy primroses to the hedgerows, daffodils shamefacedly appearing much later than some plants that have continued to flower throughout the mild winter. The sun has got us into the garden, and even the occasional lawnmower has been heard! It is the rising sap of Spring that comes with brighter days that makes us busy and check seed packets, and decide what is to be planted next.

My greenhouse received several sacks of general potting compost, decanted into two dustbins, with separate smaller bins for John Innes Nos. 1 & 2 and horticultural grit. I find all this compost around in the greenhouse can get very mud-pie-ish, if you do not keep different types separate, and slugs appear attracted to opened plastic sacks.

I stupidly left two coir compost bricks from 'Eden' soaking in a bucket of water ......my grandson found them and redistributed them as large cow pats all along my greenhouse path!

My repotting is nearly complete and all the bulbs I so carefully potted last autumn are attempting to flower, in various sunny spots around the garden.

Green shoots are visible beneath the propagator lids and the broad beans are germinating ready to pot on. I always start them off in pots to prevent the mice from eating them, though it is essential to plant them out at the right time, long before they get root bound. It is an exciting time of year with planning which new varieties to plant.

All this can easily distract you from the grot of gardening WEEDING, for it is tedious and, as fast as the new planted seedlings grow the weeds


will be growing at twice the speed, and if you have managed to start at 'ground-zero' at the beginning of the growing season, you should be able to keep up.

I love my pond, it is handy to view from the greenhouse and enjoyable to see the meanderings of fish. I had been watching for spawn as there were two frogs awaiting their dance partners, the next day there were two small dollops of spawn and one of the bachelor boy frogs riding an enormous toad (who looked rather fed up).....you could almost hear the old gal saying bloody amateurs! The spawn was dutifully put in buckets and the most forward decanted to a plastic tank for the fascination of grandson No. 1. I do like to bring on spawn so that the tadpoles are too big for the fish to eat by the time they are re-introduced to the pond. The lack of rain this Spring, especially at night, has reduced the road kill of frogs and toads. I have only seen one toad ironed on the roads this year, they are so helpless crawling along at night, attracted by the wet smooth road as a quicker way to assuage their ardour in their birth ponds.

Now the weather is kinder, my grandson has at two and a half, become almost feral, charging round the garden kicking balls, chucking balls for Mabel, dashing in and out of the jungle (shrubbery) looking for Gruffalo, digging (anywhere regardless), studying bugs, watching the fish, and 'helping' Ga-Ga in the greenhouse. 
