

## IMPORTANT - PILLATON DEFIBRILLATOR OPENING THE CABINET

In a recent emergency, people were unable to gain access to the defibrillator because they could not open the door. The correct code had been given by the ambulance service but the door will only open if door handle is then turned counter clockwise. That is towards quarter to the hour and NOT quarter past. An added irritation is that once code has been entered, it is possible to turn the handle clockwise slightly before it stops.

As can be seen in the photo below, there is guidance on opening the door above



the keypad on the cabinet. However, in an emergency and darkness this lacks clarity and significance. I have raised this issue with supplier and suggested that they arrange for ambulance service to emphasise door opening procedure.

Obviously, the optimal solution is a door handle that will allow opening either way it is turned. I will keep you informed of supplier response.

### **100 YEARS AGO**

Recently, I found myself stumbling around in an online newspaper archive, when I had one of my rare new ideas for an article in the Village News — what was happening in Pillaton 100 years ago? So here is the first of what will be an occasional (possibly, depending on the editor's mood, very infrequent) series exploring 100 and possibly similar anniversaries.

Naturally there are a huge variety of possible stories from which to choose, ranging from village fetes, births and deaths to tragic accidents, so I have had to adopt a rather scattergun (some would say blunderbuss) approach. Also, even though the newspapers of yesteryears reported matters in copious detail, as Pillaton is not the biggest place in the world, it tends not to feature that often. Therefore, I have widened my remit to include items from the wider area, including Callington and Saltash that I feel may be of interest. So here goes. In 1919, the Great War had just finished, so the first snippet involves the return of one of Pillaton's war heroes. On 9 Jan 1919 the Western Morning News reported a successful social had been held in the National Schoolroom, (now the Village Hall), Pillaton on behalf of St Dunstan's Hostel for Blinded Sailors and Soldiers. In particular, the occasion was used to welcome home Cpl William Stephens, youngest son of Harold Stephens of Pillaton Mill and Cliff Farm, Antony and congratulate him on winning the Military Medal. William had joined the Royal Artillery at Saltash in 1916 and was later promoted to corporal in the Machine Gun Corps in 1918. Lusty cheers were accorded him by all present and the proceeds of the collection amounted to £10 0s 8d. Before World War 1 much of the local land and the property was owned by

major landowners as part of large country estates. However higher taxes, death duties and shortage of labour, particularly after the war forced the decline of such estates, as reflected in the next two items. In March 1919 it was reported that a third of the parish of Callington was being put up for sale by the Marquess of

Northampton who was the hereditary Lord of the Manor. His estate in Callington included over 2000 acres of agricultural land, Goldings Hotel, the market and many other domestic properties in the town which were rented from the Marquess.

The sale was widely attended and took place at Golding's

Hotel over two days that October with all existing tenants of farms and dwelling-houses being given the first option to buy. House prices for cottages ranged from £40 to £10 and for most working people who could be living on as little as a pound a week, this represented a very significant sum. However, the sale did lead to many of the smaller properties in Callington becoming individually owned, often by the people who had lived in them for generations. On the second day of the sale Callington Market, with buildings, market fields, and cattle sheds, occupying  $2\frac{1}{2}$  acres came under the hammer and was knocked down to the local council for £1550. The final amount raised by the sale, which also included land at Calstock, was £67.000.

In a similar vein, the Quethiock Estate, part of the wider Pentillie Estate owned by the local squire William Coryton was also disposed of at an auction in Plymouth on 15 August 1919. The property comprised a number of corn, sheep dairy farms, with woods and coppices, quarries- and sporting rights, and also numerous small holdings, accommodation lands, mill properties, a fully licensed inn, blacksmith's, wheelwright's and carpenter's shops, Quethiock post office, school-house, cottages and gardens. Altogether the property covered about 4,200 acres and had previously produced a rental of over £5,500 per annum. In total the sale of the estate raised £122,872.

One wonders whether the break-up of the estate may have proved too much for William Coryton. Although he had been in failing health for a long time, just 12 days after the auction he died aged 72. He was widely respected locally and as soon as news of the death became known the tenor bell of the church at St Mellion was tolled continuously for an hour. His funeral took place in the same

church a few days later on 30 August. William Coryton was very much a traditional country squire, being Master of firstly, the East Cornwall, and then the Dartmoor Hunt, over a period of 40 years. He was also a keen agriculturist, who did much to improve the viability of his land. One of his most notable achievements being the reclamation of over 600 acres of infertile land at Viverdon Down near Amy Tree. Previously the area had consisted of boggy, acid land covered with gorse and rank vegetation, but in 1899 a successful project began to improve the drainage and bring the ground under cultivation. He also had interests in dairy farming and formed the Three Towns Dairy Company in Plymouth to distribute milk, and also supply the large liners which then came into the port.

In recent years, the press has often noted

the passing of a veteran of the First World War, or more latterly Dunkirk. In contrast, one hundred years ago in Saltash it was the death of a local veteran of the Crimean War (1853-56), aged 84, that was a point of interest.

Tragedy also struck Saltash on 30 November when seven Royal Navy sailors were drowned in the Tamar. Their ships, the sloops the Silvio and Swindon were moored above Saltash Bridge, and the men had taken a 13½ft ship's boat without permission for an ill-fated run ashore to the pub in Saltash. On their return, in strong winds, the boat had become swamped and all the men drowned, their bodies subsequently being found near Tamerton Creek.

Returning to Pillaton, on 15 December a letter from the Reverend Richard Hocking appeared in the Western Morning News enclosing a cheque for £8 17s. This sum had been collected in Pillaton in support of the newspaper's Relief Fund for the dependents of the 31 men who had died in the terrible mining disaster on 20 October at Levant Mine, Pendeen in the far west of Cornwall. The tragedy happened when a metal bracket on the man engine carrying more than 100 miners to the surface suddenly broke. The lowest levels of the mine were subsequently abandoned, so that in addition to the bereaved, many men were thrown out of work. The incident evoked sympathy on a national scale, with many fund-raising efforts being launched and King George V asking to be kept personally updated on the situation.
