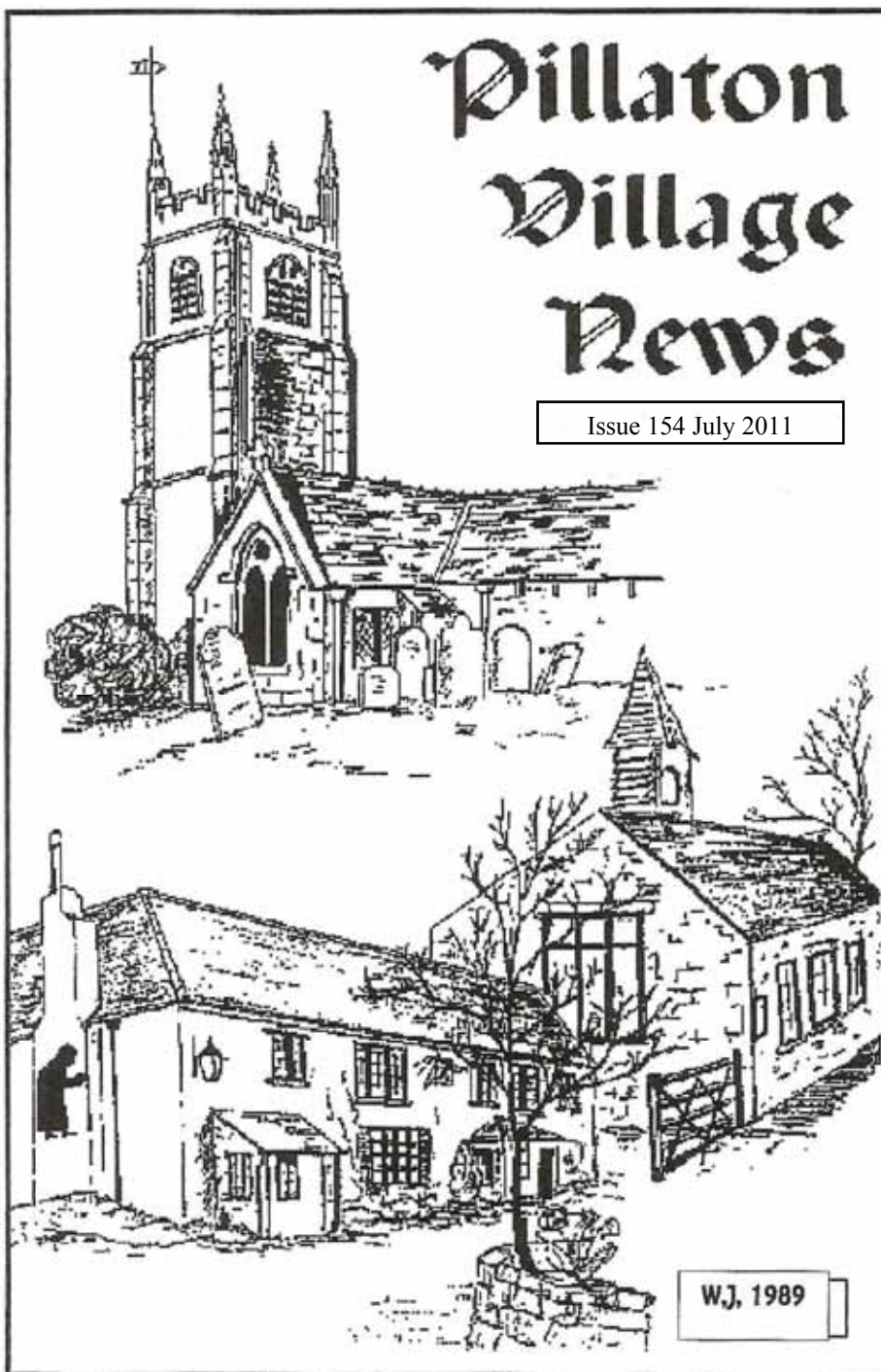

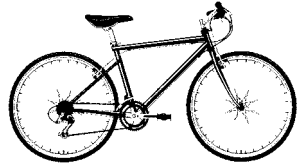

PILLATON PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of Parish Annual Council Meeting 18 May 2011

ATTENDANCE Cllrs. Dolley, Hoskin, Edwards, D. Floyd , S. Floyd , Martin , Harris and District Councillor Egglestone.

APOLOGIES None.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST Cllr Martin declared a personal interest regarding the fence and Cllrs Floyd declared a prejudicial interest in planning.

PUBLIC FORUM

There was one member of the public present.

MINUTES

The Minutes of 13th April 2011 meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

The Chairman explained that the grant for the improvements to the Hall and play park had been revised in as much as some items could be purchased locally. The decision on a mural was awaited.

Cllr Edwards kindly offered to level a space for the salt bin.

Thanks were recorded to Cllr Martin for arranging free of charge the installation of a fence behind the goal posts and the Clerk was asked to write thanking the suppliers. The Council agreed that the fence should be extended and Cllrs Dolley and Edwards volunteered to carry out the work on a temporary basis. Cllr Martin agreed to discover the cost of extending the fence on a permanent basis.

MARY MOON CLOSE

Pillaton Council could not accept responsibility for the road condition and noted that despite Cornwall Highways promise of repairs to Mary Moon Close road surface no action had been taken. The Clerk was asked to enquire into the delay pointing out the problems with the movement of disabled people. The Clerk was also asked to request a drop kerb.

PLANNING PERMISSION

Cllrs D. Floyd and S. Floyd left the meeting.

The Council approved the following application:

Rick Park farm, alterations to extension.

FINANCE

The Bank position of Current account £400 and deposit account £2,484 was noted.

The following payments were approved:

Village Hall rental £36, MOR consultancy fee £1,822.88(via a grant), audit £25, salt £164.64 and Chairman's expenses £35.

INSURANCE

The Council agreed to share insurance information with other Councils in order to attempt a reduction in premium.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Cllr Harris agreed to raise at the Cluster meeting the possibility of grants for Diamond Jubilee commemorative gifts and the progress regarding affordable housing in the area.

The Clerk was asked to request the refilling of the existing salt bins.

The Chairman regretted that Pillaton did not receive support from Cornwall Highways and that Mushton Lane had not been repaired. The Chairman noted that a new grant for the Playing field had been awarded, that a net and a fence had been erected at the Playing field and that the Council had dealt with planning application processes.
4. Mr Millward asked for the net at the Playing field to be extended and the Council promised assistance.

The Minutes of 18th May 2011 meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

The Chairman outlined the progress for the improvements to the Hall and play park and would ask the Consultants if funds could be used for the extension of the fence at the top of the field.

Cllr Martin agreed to discover the cost of installing poles for the fence.

Highways had written stating that repairs to Mary Moon Close road surface were the responsibility of Cornwall Housing. The Clerk was asked to enquire into the matter.

Cllr Harris is continuing to enquire at the Cluster meeting the possibility of grants for Diamond Jubilee commemorative gifts

The refilling of the original salt bins was awaited.

HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENTS

Cornwall Highways had informed the Parish council that:

The installation of ribbed lines to slow traffic was imminent.

The Parish Council could ask for materials to repaint the finger posts.

There were no funds to repair Mushton Lane and no usage statistics had been provided.

Accordingly the Clerk was asked to; request materials to repaint the finger posts (and ask if payment was made): enquire into the apparent unauthorised closure of Mushton Lane and to point out the dangerous state of the Lane.

An 'unsuitable for heavy vehicles' sign was requested for the narrow lane passing Kernock to Pillaton.

PLANNING PERMISSION

The Council approved the following applications;

Change of use from agricultural land to burial ground at Pillaton Church.

The installation of heat pumps at Kernock House.

FINANCE

The Bank position of current account £76 and deposit account £3,554 was noted.

The following payment was approved:

MOR consultancy fee £600(via a grant).

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

The Council agreed to ask about affordable housing in the area.

Before the election of Officers the Chairman thanked the Committee for their continued support. He spoke of various items that had required attention over the past year. He stated that Calweton Building Construction Ltd., and Mr. R. Harnet had been accepted by the Pillaton Playground Project to carry out and supply material for the forthcoming enhancement of the Village Hall and surrounding area. He had met the builder and one item discussed was the amount of tarmac to be used. The Chairman then raised the question of the Mural on the heating oil tank wall. The Secretary put forward the point of the Women's Institute, that being glazed tiles. The Chairman suggested an open competition to the villagers to submit their concept of a painted mural within a given time and post same in a box to be placed outside the Old Post Office. This was proposed by I. Edwards and seconded by Mrs. S. White. The Chairman did state, however, that the terms of the Lottery Grant stated that the mural must be carried out by a professional person. Mr. C. Ley agreed to draft a notice (see page 12).

The Treasurer in his report stated that the accounts for the past year to 31st March 2011 showed an income amounting to £3008.87 with expenditure of £2365.59. A satisfactory year.

Upon closing this brief account of the above meeting, the Chairman wishes me to mention his grateful thanks for the support of the parishioners of Pillaton throughout the past year and may the usage of the hall continue to play its part in the village community.

PILLATON WI

Furrowed brows and serious faces in the Village Hall at the May meeting as members listened to and joined in the debate on this year's national resolutions. A précis of the arguments heard at the Spring Countdown meeting in Truro was presented by Pillaton WI member Lesley Allibone. First up, "This meeting abhors the practice of factory farming, particularly large animals such as pigs and cows and urges HM Government to ensure planning permission is not granted for such projects". An emotive subject, this one, and our farming members were reticent about expressing their feelings. Persuasive arguments for farming on an industrial scale drew heavily on the need to feed the world and had counter arguments to allay fears about issues such as the methane gas produced during the farming process, disease management etc.

Against included the instinctive feeling that it cannot be right for animals to be reared in such unnatural conditions; the physical and behavioural health problems that would be likely to ensue and the suggestion that the third world realistically would be unlikely to benefit from meat reared in this way, whilst the Western world continues to eat and grow ever fatter. The vote was marginally in favour of supporting the resolution, but with a number of abstentions.

The second resolution asked "This meeting urges HM Government to maintain support for local libraries, as an essential local educational and information resource." Hmm. This one was a bit woolly making it even more difficult to decide whether to support it or not. There were some staunch supporters of local libraries amongst the members present, many with memories of taking their own children to the library to choose library books and do their homework. Arguments against suggested that today's young people are far more likely to research their homework online and many of our own information needs can be met by the Internet. The budgetary constraints of Local Authorities were mentioned, and competition for valuable financial resources. Realistically, for example, would we want to keep the local swimming pool open or protect library opening hours? The show of hands when the vote was taken indicated an even smaller margin of support for the resolution, with many members again abstaining.

The serious stuff over, we enjoyed listening to local farmers Christopher and Margaret Best, who regaled us with the story of their invitation to The Wedding! That is, of course, Kate and William's wedding - The Royal

Wedding. We could all identify with Margaret when her first reaction was “But I haven’t got anything to wear!” The story of how she found her perfect outfit was great fun to hear and she brought it all along to show us – frock, jacket, hat, and shoes to die for. The only thing missing on the night was the champagne toast to the Royal couple.

The brief business meeting guided us through key events in the County News and we were invited to add our names to the lists circulating for the Watercolour workshop on July 22; the Minack trip on August 24 and the Double Duchy Day on September 13. It was agreed that Pillaton WI would send a donation to the Cornwall Federation towards the car park at Chy Noweth.

Of local importance, the village party organised by the WI to celebrate the Royal Wedding had been a huge success and a repeat event will be organised next year to celebrate the Queen’s Diamond Jubilee.

Our **June** meeting featured a guest speaker from local pasty company, Ginsters. I was on holiday so unfortunately wasn’t able to attend and cannot report, but I hear it was an interesting evening.

The next meetings will be on July 11, when we will hear a talk on Recycling, and then we meet again on September 12, when the topic is “Willow Work”.

FRUIT CASE

Now that summer has arrived, the weather has turned more April-like, heavy showers and bursts of hot sun that turns our gardens into jungles overnight. A week of distraction, in the form of family visits that give no time for a single weed to be pulled, and the garden has developed a mind of its own. My beautiful broccoli, plants have bolted, cabbages have turned into Nottingham lace by voracious cabbage white caterpillars, broad beans have developed the sticky dusting of black-fly, and the blackcurrant bushes have something eating them....and 'Horror on horrors head accumulate' there seems to be a leak in my pond.

Sometimes I wonder why I bother, when I toil so hard in the garden, and the flora and fauna do not appreciate my efforts and do their own thing. Luckily the rewards outstrip the problems, making it all worthwhile.

I am very pleased with my broad beans this year, and they have the added benefit with the peas of being a crop you can graze, whilst weeding. Why bother to cook them, when you can eat them straight from the pod, like

sweeties. I showed my, nearly two grandson how to pick pea pods, show him all the perfect peas lined up ready for his little finger to pick up and pop into his smiling mouth. I picked a broad bean pod, opened it to reveal the immature beans bedded in the moss-like lining, which tiny fingers had to stroke before they greedily gathered the beans. A much better treat than the sweets he is not allowed.

Years ago I introduced my son to my raspberry patch this way, and remember him toddling off to the end of the garden, where he would eventually emerge with red raspberry stains on face and hair. He was barely able to walk straight but he knew where the raspberries were.

the fruit of my worcester berries too. A cross between a gooseberry and a blackcurrant, the fruits are the size of a small grape, the veining transparency of a gooseberry, with the flush of a blackcurrant colour, and an interesting flavour. Delicious. I will gather them in the next week. Thank you Rosemary for your idea.

Dog-walking friends are still growling about the increase of dog-mess in the village which soils their reputation as responsible dog owners (who doggedly clean up after their 'best friends'). Undoubtedly the worst offender is the 'phantom faeces maker' (yet to be identified) who daily fouls

street, and entrances to properties, creating damage to carpets, unhealthy, anti-social mess, and bad feeling in the village. Clues....a very early visitor, who goes through the main street leaving deposits, usually equi-distantly spaced, as though the poor dog is dragged, and not given time to squat, which in itself is cruel. The mess was not left at Easter, so they must have been away. Is the dog on a lead with a runner or cyclist? (seen near Hatt). If you see a person fouling our village please take a photo of them, and tell them they are entitled to a fine.

'You are now required to clean up after your dog after it has fouled (and properly dispose of it) when your dog fouls in any area, to which the public are entitled to have access. Failing to clean up after your dog has fouled will result in a fixed penalty being issued -which is £80 (reduced to £50 if paid within 10 days) or prosecution where, if guilty, you would face a maximum fine of £1000.' Cornwall County Council.

I am afraid this is all getting a bit heavy, but needs must, and we all need a kick in the bot, now and then.
