

The early part of November is an important time of year with its emphasis on Remembrance and remembering all those who sacrificed their lives in the service of this country. A few years ago Don King researched the lives of the local men who died during the First World War. The Pillaton War Memorial also records two other men who died in the Second World War, Leonar

Memorial also records two other men who died in the Second World War, Leonard John Fowell and Douglas Harry Search, and Don has recently been taking a look at what happened to them (see pages 10 and 11).

Now, when I was young, my parents always told me that as you get older, time passes more quickly and everything seems to change. They weren't wrong. These days I feel as though life is a bit like trying to keep up with motorway traffic in a Robin Reliant, 3-wheel car, in search of a Welcome Break service station. Was it really a little over a year ago we were talking about Afghanistan and the fall of Kabul, booster jabs for Covid and the Tokyo Olympics? The 'Partygate' controversy hadn't yet emerged, and all was quiet in eastern Europe. Since then the last 12 months have passed in a blur with the most significant war in Europe for 80 years, the beginning of a new Carolean Age, and the UK is onto its third Prime Minister of the year. Should anyone appear on 'Pointless' in the near future, names of any recent British cabinet ministers would be a dead cert for a pointless answer.

On top of all this the economic outlook looks incredibly gloomy with high energy costs, inflation and, by the time you read this, the likelihood of tax increases as a result of the Chancellor's Autumn Statement. Also, our reservoirs are in desperate need of being topped up. However, South West Water has promised consumers £30 off their bills if they exercise restraint in their water usage to allow Bodmin Moor's Colliford reservoir to fill to 30% capacity by the New Year — so for us in Cornwall that means fewer baths and more showering together.

Still, it's not all doom and gloom, Christmas is on its way and as you will find scattered through the pages of this Village News, there are a number of festive activities planned for the village.

MINUTES

The minutes of 6 September 2022 council meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

Playing Field

- a) Cllr Johnson reported that a risk assessment paid for by the Playing Field Support Group would be carried out in mid October.
- b) It was noted that football nets had been erected by the Chairman and fellow Councillors and that the signage now included a contact number.
- c) It was decided to await the results of the risk assessment before considering phase 3 of additions to the play equipment.

Telephone Box

The Council appreciated that the poor quality of the painting of the box was caused by wet weather and understood that the work would be remedied in the spring. In the meantime the Council approved a payment of £300 for the work to date. The Chairman undertook to investigate the cost of sand blasting or paint stripping the box.

PLANNING APPLICATION

The Council approved application PA22/08111 for a Single storey conservatory extension to Stonivan Pillaton for Mr James Barron.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Councillor Warne informed the Council that he was actively pursuing the firm employed to maintain the Wifi connection to the defibrillator to correct a fault.

MINUTES OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 1 NOVEMBER 2022

<u>ATTENDANCE</u> Cllrs, Dolley, Bunkum, Warne, Moore, Ley, Johnson and Floyd. <u>APOLOGIES</u> None.

PUBLIC FORUM

There were 3 members of the public present.

MINUTES

The minutes of 28 September 2022 council meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

Defibrillator

Cllr Warne informed the Council that the firm employed to maintain the Wifi connection to the defibrillator had corrected the fault but that the recent thunderstorms had upset the system. He would continue to monitor the equipment.

Playing Field

Cllr Johnson reported that the inspection of the playing field for the ROSPA risk assessment carried out on 24 October indicated no significant faults. The report recommended the placing of a sign forbidding kite flying and care be taken to ensure football games did not conflict with use of the climbing frame. The full risk assessment is expected shortly.

The Council agreed to place an order for replacing rotten timbers highlighted in the safety report.

PLANNING APPLICATION

The Council approved application PA/08262 Construction of balcony and external fenestration alterations, internal alterations, construction of glazed garden room, replacement detached garage at Polborder Farm Barns for Mrs. P Zimmer.

MAINTENANCE OF PATHWAY

In response to a request from the project for a walkway through the Tamar Valley the Council resolved not to accept responsibility to pay for the maintenance of a proposed pathway on Pentillie land as they did not wish to burden the Council with a long term and unknown liability on private property.

FINANCE

The Council agreed a precept of £4,569 for the year 2023 to 2024 being a reduction of 6.5% on the previous year.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Cllr Warne informed the Council that the local association of Councils (CNA) was being reduced by Cornwall Council and that Pillaton would be given the choice of linking in with the Launceston grouping or Saltash Gateway.

It was noted that the Village Hall Committee would be discussing the possibility of the use of the hall as a warm location should there be a need in the Village.

The Clerk was asked to request the repair of the broken and blocked stiles on the public footpath.

PILLATON TOWER LIGHTNING STRIKE

Commemoration Service 22nd January 2023

Those who have lived in the village for more than ten years will remember the night of 21st January 2013 when the church tower was struck by lightning. Pieces of an exploding pinnacle shot through the roof of the church, destroying the children's area and destabilising the North West corner of the church, flying granite damaged pews and the church was filled with rubble and debris. Stone even hit parts of the pub next door. Following an outstanding effort by the community the church was repaired and back in use within nine months.

To commemorate the tenth anniversary of the lightning strike a special service will take place in the church at 10.00 am on Sunday 22nd January 2023.


We very much hope that all our community will join us for this celebration, together with those who were involved in the restoration of the church.

DISCONTINUED POSTAGE STAMPS

If you have purchased postage stamps recently you may have noticed that definitive stamps (those with the monarch's head on them) and the new Christmas stamps now include a barcode. Royal Mail has now announced that after 31 January 2023, older definitive stamps (those with the Queen's head on them) without a barcode will no longer be valid, although this deadline does not apply to any special commemorative stamps or Christmas Stamps without barcodes.

So if you have any of the older Queen's head stamps tucked away you should

endeavour to use them up by 31 January next year. They can also be swapped for the newer barcode types, but to do this you will need to download a special 'Stamp Swap Out' form from the Royal Mail website. Then 'to swap out' your stamps, complete the form and send it off (Freepost) to Royal Mail along with your non-barcoded stamps. These forms should also be available from post offices.

PILLATON WAR MEMORIAL WORLD WAR 2 NAMES

LEONARD JOHN FOWELL

Leonard was born in Pillaton on 13 October 1919 and was the elder son of Arthur John Fowell and Catherine Jeanie Roose, both born in Pillaton. In the 1911 census, Arthur is recorded as working on his father's farm at Moditon, St. Mellion, but there were Fowells living in Pillaton in the early 1800s. Their second son was Herbert Daniel Fowell born in 1921 and lived until 1995.

During the war Leonard served with the RAF as an Aircraftsman 1st class, with 204 Squadron, in Coastal Command. This squadron was equipped with Sunderland flying boats and began training on them in June 1939 at Mount Batten, Plymouth. In early 1940 Leonard was sent as part of an advance party from 204 Sqn to prepare for the move of the squadron to the Shetlands. At the end of March 1940 204 Sqn was moved from Plymouth to Sullom Voe in the Shetlands to patrol the gap between Norway and Iceland and stop U boats getting out into the Atlantic. A careful watch was also being kept on Norway where it was believed a German invasion was imminent. The squadron found this location far more dangerous than the Western Approaches where it had previously patrolled, with German fighter pilots always being on full alert.

The huge bulk of the Sunderland made it an easy target for a modern fighter aircraft and on 8 April, Leonard's Sunderland (No.L5799,KG-D) was lost while searching for the German invasion fleet. The description in the official report on the incident read as follows: The Sunderland "took off 10.30 hours from Sullom Voe, tasked with a recce mission off the coast of Norway. The Sunderland failed to return after signalling an ETA 30 minutes before it was due to start the return leg and was shot down in a running dog fight with a Heinkel 111 and crashed into the sea west of Bergen, Norway." Leonard Fowler died with 8 other airmen, many young men like himself, and the names of the crew are all commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial.

Early the next morning, 9 April 1940, Germany occupied Denmark and invaded Norway.

DOUGLAS HARRY SEARCH

Douglas's birth was recorded in January 1923 in West Ham in East London, and he was the son of Harry Samuel Search and Elsie Maud Mary Search (nee Leader). Harry Search, at the time of his son's death, was landlord of the Royal Oak (now the Weary Friar) in Pillaton. Harry had been a successful fruit trader in East London throughout the 1920s and 30s and he went back there after the war so perhaps his family had had to leave London because of the bombing raids in that area. Douglas enlisted on 19 March 1942 into the 2nd Battalion of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry Regiment (DCLI). By that time the battalion had already seen much action having fought in France and been evacuated from Dunkirk in 1940. The battalion then spent a couple of years refitting and undergoing specialist training with Douglas joining the battalion just as it was sent to Scotland for intensive training in combined operations, especially beach landings.

In March 1943 the battalion was sent to Tunis as part of the 8th Army's 4th Division. Tough fighting followed with the 2nd Bn opening the final battle for Tunis in May. Casualty rates could be high. A and D companies for example lost five officers and 77 other ranks killed and Douglas must have known some of these men, but we don't know which company he was in at the time. The Italian and German armies in North Africa capitulated on 11 and 12 May and the battalion then enjoyed a few months of rest and training, with numbers being brought up to strength. In July 1943 Mussolini was deposed and then in August the Allies captured Sicily. Further landings were made on the toe of Italy and then at Salerno. This forced the Germans back northwards to a number of carefully built defensive positions, including one known as the "Gustav Line," close to the town of Cassino. By 2 November 1943 advanced Allied units reached the Gustav line and there then followed three set battles over five months to capture Cassino and the ancient monastery on Monte Cassino that overlooked the town. The battles are claimed to be the hardest fought in WW2. The Allies decided to use overwhelming force to finally dislodge the stubborn German defenders in a decisive fourth battle and then break through to Rome. The 2nd Bn DCLI was going to be part of this final attempt. In February 1944, the 2nd Bn left Egypt for Naples and was then sent to defend Monte Ornito 25 km south of Cassino. Here the DCLI had their first experience of crossing steep mountains covered in boulders and large stones, where mules were the only feasible transport and snow, rain and mist made for miserable conditions. In mid-March, the battalion was relieved and rested near Naples, before being sent to relieve the 3rd Algerian Division in the mountains north of Cassino. On 4 April, the 2nd Bn, along with other units of the 4th Division were scheduled to be relieved a few days later and sent for river crossing training in preparation for the planned massive attack to try and breakthrough the Cassino blockage. The DCLI War Diary for 4 April reports on the arrangements being made for the relief on the night of 7 and 8 April. This was a relatively quiet week apart from sporadic shelling and mortar attacks and by the early hours of 8 April the handover by A, C and D companies had been successfully completed. The only casualties mentioned in this period were two C company men wounded on 5 April, two B company men wounded by mortar fire on the 6th, and another B company man killed on the 8th by a burst of heavy fire just before the relief was completed. Douglas, who is recorded as having died on 9 April, could have been one of those wounded on 8 April, or the B company man killed also on the 8th. There were no other 2nd Bn casualties during this otherwise unopposed relief so Douglas was very unlucky to be killed at this time. He is commemorated in the Cassino War Cemetery. Meanwhile preparations were now underway for the final major push to try to breakthrough to Rome and on 13 May under heavy German fire the battalion crossed the Rapido river just south of Cassino followed by tanks and other units of

the British 4th Division of the 8th Army. The battle for Cassino was as good as over.

Christmas Tree Festival 2022 Repair, Reuse Recycle

Update on the Festival at St Odulph's Church 11th - 31st December

Christmas is only a few weeks away so it's time to get going on our unique eco-friendly Christmas Tree Festival. This is a project everyone can take part in, with lots of very interesting ideas being bandied about. It will be fascinating to see what innovative creations people can produce from limited resources. Here is a reminder of what it is all about:

Can you make and decorate a Christmas tree using only recycled, reused or repaired items? Anything decorative can be included as long as it has had a previous life. Your trees can illustrate your individual interests, carry a message or represent your hobby groups, the choice is yours, just as long as it is in the recognisable traditional Christmas tree shape. The trees will be displayed in Pillaton Church as part of the Christmas decorations for this year when the focus is on saving both money and the environment.

Trina has offered to host an afternoon (see opposite) on Saturday 26 November, 12.00 to 4.00 pm, at the Weary Friar, for children to make little Christmas trees to be included in the main display in the Church ready for the Toy Service on 11 December.

THE BUILDING NEXT TO THE PUB (3)

"Use it or Lose It" by the Rev Chris Painter back in the May edition of the Village News prompted responses from Sue McClaughry and Maire Warwick in the July and September editions respectively. I read all three articles with equal amounts of interest and horror.

<u>Where We Are Now</u> Rev Chris warned that if we (The Villagers) don't use the church then it is in danger of being closed and Sue responded with a piece detailing the history of St Odulph's church and suggested the creation of a 'Friends of Pillaton Church' group, to try and fundraise and keep the church open for future generations. Whilst Sue is of course right, the church building has no running water, nor toilet facilities, these issues are not insurmountable and could be resolved by the implementation of a greater plan which could see the internal footprint of the church reconfigured so that it was a much more usable space.

Hope For The Future Rev Chris wrote in May, "What is important is the history of the building, wrapped up with the national and local cultural story. A significant place in the life events of the local community." I have been reading widely around these subjects and recently came across a piece by the comedian Hugh Dennis who, having lived next to churches for nearly half of his life, said that "Many rural churches are like spring bulbs, waiting for the right conditions to release all the potential they hold and to thrive". This followed a comment by the Right Reverend Dr John Inge, Bishop of Worcester, who said "Church Buildings should never be silent mausoleums, but always vibrant centres of service at the heart of their local communities," and who has also referred to churches as "Palaces of Memory".

Friends Of Pillaton Church Maire acknowledged Sue's idea of creating a 'Friends of Pillaton Church' group to fundraise, with the aim of adapting the church to become sustainable and maintain its integral part of the village. There certainly are grants available for works such as these and the village itself has such a wealth of talented people that it seems inconceivable we couldn't achieve a vision of an adapted, workable, different space that would allow the regular churchgoers to continue to practice their faith, but would also allow other villagers to use the space, which is also their church, whether or not they attend church services.

Since Barry and I arrived in Pillaton 3 years ago (Yes, three years!) we have been blown away by the sense of community here and we felt this even more keenly as we approached and celebrated our wedding in the church at the end of April this year. There is energy and enthusiasm in our village and following the suggestions to create a "Friends of Pillaton" group, there have been a number of people who have expressed an interest in joining such a group. There is room for more people though and the more the merrier! In my view it would be essential to have representation from the different groups that already exist within the village, so that there is a large cross section and a concentration of the talents and skills that

exist amongst us. There are plans for a display board at the coffee morning in The Weary Friar on Tuesday 29^{th} November (11.00 am to 1.00 pm) to share these ideas and to consult with villagers – there will be an opportunity to have your say and make suggestions. The plan is for the display to then move into the church, where it can be viewed every day when the church is open.

Conclusion As I have tried to understand the mechanics of these issues, somebody recently helped me by explaining that the pub, the village hall, and the church are like a 3-legged stool - take one of the legs away and the stool will fall over. (In fact, the Pillaton Village News from 2010 to 2012 have all 3 'legs' on the front cover!) If all three 'legs' work with each other then surely we can prevent the closure of the church? As a village we have the chance to create something amazing that will flourish, be fruitful and sustainable and be a legacy for our children and grandchildren. I believe that St Odulph's church building – the Palace of Pillaton – has many years left in her yet. We just have to believe in our visions and make them happen.


