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
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

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

MATTERS ARISING

STOPPING UP ORDER

The Council decided to respond to the review of polling places and districts by Cornwall Council that Pillaton Village hall was the most suitable site for the area.

PLANNING PERMISSION

The Council approved the planning application for a single storey extension at Bearah.

FINANCE

The Bank position of £2,302 was noted.

The following payments were authorised; D. Whittley mural artist £800 and HMRC £180 for tax deducted from Clerk's salary.

The Council approved the financial accounts and annual return for the year ended 31 March 2012.

FEEDBACK FROM COMMUNITY AREA NETWORK

The Chairman reported on his visit to the previous Network meeting where he had raised the issue of feedback on planning decisions.


The Annual Meeting followed, with Treasurer Sue Archer presenting the Financial Statement for the year ended December 2011.

WI MEETING APRIL 2012

Following the usual business section of our monthly WI meeting, we were given a talk and slide show on a wonderful holiday in Antarctica had by Alison, Liz, Trish and Ronnie (a friend of Alison's from afar.)

Before I go on to give you some details of their trip, I would like to ask you to picture a penguin and to think how it stands and how it walks. Hopefully in your mind's eye you are now conjuring up thoughts of a penguin with its wings sticking slightly out from its sides, walking quite stiffly and wobbling from side to side. Hang onto this image until later.

Our four ladies' story started right here in Pillaton when they received a list of required clothing needed to face the Antarctic weather where temperatures were way below zero. The list included thermal underwear, lots of socks, wellies and red very warm jackets. As they were also planning to visit Buenos Aires and Santiago, where the temperature would be considerably higher, 30 degrees plus, they also needed summer clothes. This meant skilful packing as the airlines baggage restriction was 20 kg.

Those of you who know Alison will know that she freely admits to taking everything for all eventualities when travelling "just in case." A very useful person to have around when you need something slightly unusual, but of course this all added to the difficulty of confining herself to 20 kg of luggage. The answer to this dilemma was to wear several layers to travel in — they didn't have a picture showing us the result of this decision but I am sure we can all make a good guess at what they might have looked like!

After an overnight flight they landed in Buenos Aires and went to their hotel. Once there they overcame their lack of sleep and signed up to go immediately on a city tour followed by dinner and the opportunity to see people dancing the Argentinian tango. They also signed up to visit a Gaucho ranch the next day.

The city tour was interesting where amongst other things they saw brightly painted houses, an English clock tower with a Royal coat of arms and the cemetery where Eva Peron is buried. They also saw a giant Ombu tree where it is said that people used to sit and play chess. However on that day, only one man was there dancing the Argentinian tango by himself. This was the forerunner to watching more of this dance during dinner. Liz's description was "Sex on legs, very raunchy and not a bit like Strictly Come Dancing!"

The next day heralded the visit to the Gaucho ranch where there was a choice of transport to go around the ranch. The choice was by buggy or on horseback. Three of the four chose to go by buggy and the fourth, Alison, good old Alison,

decided to give the horse a go and very good she looked too. However when dismounting she caught her foot in the stirrup and had to be helped off by a very good looking Gaucho. Ulterior motive here do you think?

On the following day they had a four-hour flight which took them alongside the Andes to Ushuaia at the tip of Argentina. Their first impressions were how strong the wind was and would Trish be blown away.

Once onboard the ship the first announcement was that seasick pills were available to all. The intrepid four decided to be safe and not sorry and took these. This turned out to be advisable as it was a very rough journey through Drake's passage.

Their first view of the Antarctic they described as "stunning" and their pictures certainly demonstrated this. There were huge icebergs, smaller ones and even some that appeared to be forming cliffs.

The first island visited was Deception Island, a collapsed volcanic cone. The passengers were divided into small groups in order to go by zodiac around the island. Our four were in one of the last groups to go at which time the good weather ceased and the sea became grey and choppy resulting in them having to return sooner than had been hoped to the ship.

The next outing was to Paradise Harbour where again they went in small groups. Here they came face to face with actual penguins and soon learnt the "rules of the road". These were very simple - penguins can do anything and always have the right of way. Paradise Harbour itself they described as being a bit desolate with only a little bit of grass and lichens. Apparently the biggest predators were the mossies living on the penguins.

Getting ready for these trips was a bit of a task. Two pairs of socks, thermal undies, trousers, waterproofs, wellies, coats, hats and gloves were the order of the day. Now, just think back to the image you had of penguins waddling and wobbling as they walked along and transfer this image to that of the ladies well wrapped in their multi-layers. Can you see any similarities? If I had their photo to show you, you would!

So, back to the real penguins and their rights of way. There were areas roped off with notices saying "penguins only." Can they read I wonder? Apparently they were Gentoo penguins and are very friendly. They sit and "chatter" and there were a number of babies who were just balls of fluff. However as they regularly steal each other's nest building materials, Alison described them as "thieving little blighters". There was also one poor lonely Chinstrap penguin looking very sad. No one was sure where he had come from.

Back on board they were able to view part of a range of mountains nicknamed "Una's Tits" after a Falklands office secretary! They also had a demonstration of ice carving resulting in a beautiful ice swan. By this time the sun was shining so it was drinks all round whilst sitting on deck and generally enjoying the ambience.

A later stop enabled them to see Megallanic penguins. These didn't seem to have much of a brain as they took the most difficult path to the beach, which entailed climbing in and out of a ditch and struggling over a tree trunk. However once there they did seem to be more organized. The babies were left in the nursery whilst the mums and dads frolicked in the water. What a wonderful sight this must have been.

Liz, Alison and Trish gave us many more stories of their adventures and certainly made me wish that I had been with them. Their pictures were beautiful and the maps and books that they had with them very interesting. The WI audience enjoyed the presentation very much. So thank you Liz, Alison and Trish.

WI GROUP MEETING

Pillaton WI is part of the Blunts group of WI's consisting of Blunts, Botus Fleming and us here in the village. The group meeting is held annually and this year was our turn on 12 April. Preparation for this event had started some months ago to make sure that we were ready The event needed a theme so we decided to make this musical and to have the competitions – flower arranging, craft and cookery- to reflect this. So the title for the flower arranging was "Spring, Spring, Spring", the cookery "Oranges and Lemons" in the form of a drizzle cake and craft "In Your Easter Bonnet" in the form of a decorated hat. We also decided that as entertainment we would ask the Larrick Lads, a male voice choir from Saltash, to come and join us.

The meeting opened with everyone singing "Jerusalem", which, with so many of us there sounded wonderful and raised the village hall roof. RINGING NEWS

HANDBELLS

The Pillaton and St Mellion Handbell Ringers have once again retained the Cornish Music Festival Trophy by competing in the open

handbell ringing class at Truro. This year we rang Bach's 'Air on a G String' and 'Chariots of Fire' by Vangelis. The latter is an exciting arrangement of a well-known melody using several ringing techniques and we thought particularly appropriate for Olympic Year.

Back in February the team also won the Saltash Music Festival Handbell Trophy, narrowly beating the St Dominick team who won it last year, whilst in May we shall be entertaining French visitors involved in the Callington Twinning Association exchange.

Our Wednesday practices continue to be pleasant occasions combining musical challenges with a friendly social evening.

TOWER BELLS

The tower bell ringers recently held their AGM at the Weary Friar, combining it with a nice meal and a few glasses of wine. The Captain, Richard Warwick, reported on another successful year with the ringers continuing to make progress. The new eight bells have attracted visiting ringers from all over the country who have all been impressed with the quality of the peal. He said it was now time to recruit new ringers so that the tradition of bellringing in Pillaton remains strong and asked everyone to spread the word to anyone who might be interested in learning to ring.

Tower bell ringing is a friendly pursuit, suited to all ages. Children can learn to ring as soon as they are tall enough to reach the ropes (we have boxes for smaller ones to stand on!) and there is no upper age limit (ringers in their 90s are not uncommon). It exercises the body without putting too much stress on joints or muscles and most people can learn to handle a bell within a few weeks or months. Once the physical skills are mastered, those who wish to can challenge their minds by learning method ringing — a series of patterns of changes requiring memory and coordination. Tuesday practices start at 7.30 pm and are always followed by a get together in the Weary Friar at 9 o'clock.

DOGS

I have recently seen notices around the Village about noisy dogs and have heard about dogs fouling and not legally under control i.e. roaming without their owner. Firstly, the vast majority of dog owners in the Village always have their dogs under control and pick up after their dogs whilst out giving them exercise. However, in case you are the exception I have laid out below current controls under which Cornwall Council can take action.



Barking dogs: Environmental Protection Act 1990

Whilst dogs are allowed to bark, they are not allowed to bark so that it causes a nuisance. It is a matter of fact and degree in each case and factors that may be taken into account include the volume, duration of the barking and the time of day it happens.

If a complaint is made to a Council, they have a duty to investigate it. The Council may serve a Noise Abatement Notice and if the barking continues then they may prosecute under the Environmental Protection Act 1990. The likely penalty is a fine.

Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005

It gives Councils the power to make orders regarding dogs in their area providing the offence relates to the control of dogs if it relates to one of the following matters:

- Fouling of land by dogs and the removal of dog faeces
- The keeping of dogs on leads
- The exclusion of dogs from land
- The number of dogs which a person may take on to any land

It is not an excuse, in law that you were not aware of the fact that the dog had fouled - so you can be held responsible even if you did not see the incident, or if it is witnessed whilst the dog is straying.

The Council has the power to issue fixed penalty fines of £80 for the above.

FRUIT CASE

The last month has been bloomin' lovely, and I am already in mourning at the loss of the cherry tree blossom that hung so deliciously over my garden; it wafted as pink butterflies, confetting bed and lawn. I love the floriferous weeks full of camellias, magnolias, and now the rhodos have started. The clematis montana and rubens are beginning to explode their stars of colour in clouds over my back fence. It is almost too much beauty to cope with. I must not allow myself too much gazing as the garden is expected to return some produce in exchange for my efforts, and those boring vegetables have less beauty but more useful attributes.

I (and others) have spent the last few weeks putting in a new pond. My old pond is near the greenhouse and though a welcome distraction from jobs, has become overgrown, overstocked and in need of some radical TLC. Ponds do attract a considerable amount of wildlife, which is wonderful - except when it comes in the form of a heron! His last visit took the biscuit, (or rather a lot of goldfish) and while I appreciate how hungry he must have been to totally demolish my nets, wires and anti-cat bleepers, did he have to eat my favourite shubunkin with the most exquisite patterns?

The new pond has been placed in front of house, visible from the conservatory, and boasts a small waterfall, while the lilies and marginal plants have been re-potted and seem to be surviving the moving experience. It is not just a sleight of hand, but in moving ponds there is a vast amount of stuff, labouring and muck. The waterfall has to be fitted and supported with rocks, and plants have to be moved, just when some of the hostas have started uncurling their leaves. It is quite a job.

The fun begins when you try and catch the fish - if there are any left, as none of them come to the surface to be fed at 9.30 as they did before the heron visited. Apparently he had stood on my roof and picked out the prettiest for breakfast. The old pond was a good quality butyl liner which always leaked after the first heronic visit two years ago; the new pond is a pre-formed shape smaller in volume, but easier to manage and more resistant to piercing with beaks!

We had to half empty the pond (thank goodness I have no sense of smell) and with a huge pike-sized net and a minnow-sized net eventually caught about 60 goldfish and shubunkins, seven frogs, one toad and at least 18 newts. All were washed in clean rainwater in the 'sick-bay' fish tank before being transferred to the new pond. The last four inches of cow-pat consistency slop

at the bottom was cleared by me as the rest of the family, being possessed with perfect olfactory function, decided on a siesta instead. I do hope all those buckets of slimy slop were not as toxic as it looked or my broad bean crop will be annihilated. I did find another 22 fish hiding there too, including one tiny soul rescued from the bean bed! I still have to finish the clean up, reduce the size of the pond and keep it wild, as the frogs will soon hop back there.

The problem of heron and cat proofing has been researched, and I have used a floating pond net which is so much more discreet than the open shaft mine fencing, netting and wires that had failed so spectacularly. The reconditioned ultra sonic catwatch will also help to repel ferals looking for a free lunch.



Is it three or four full sacks still waiting collection after five weeks? Such a charming entry to our village by the sign, and if this continues we can stack these accumulating sacks in a neat archway, like Noddy's Toyland. Better still we could deliver them to the council as a token of our disgust at their failure to provide an adequate service.

It was sad to hear of the death of one of the Pillaton dogs, run over in the village. It should remind us all that dogs are creature of instinct to which they will respond quicker than any human command. Dogs, I've always felt, should be on a lead, particularly in a village with no pavements.

Lastly, a few weeks ago a healthy, large pet rabbit was causing concern when discovered munching its way through Jenny's flower beds, and nobody knew who owned him. Maybe there should be a register of animals and addresses? He hopped from garden to garden enjoying himself with his more than five vegetable portions a day, and leaving a denuded path behind him!
